BRICK STREET CHOCOLATE CAKE

All your dreams come true in a rich, dense chocolate cake with a rich chocolate ganache icing!

Cake

- 2 C sugar
- 1 C unsalted butter, softened
- 1 ½ tsp pure vanilla extract
- 3 large eggs
- 2 ½ C cake flour
- 1 C baking cocoa, sifted
- 2 tsp baking soda
- ½ tsp salt
- ½ C instant chocolate pudding mix
- 2 ¼ C buttermilk
- 1 C semi-sweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Beat sugar, butter and vanilla in large bowl. Beat in eggs. Mix in cake flour, baking cocoa, soda, salt, chocolate pudding and buttermilk. Stir in chocolate chips. Pour into greased tube and bake for 30 minutes; turn down temperature to 325 degrees and continue baking for 30-40 minutes, until tester comes clean. Cool completely before icing.



Chocolate Icing

- ½ C water
- % C butter
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 C baking cocoa, sifted
- 3 ½ C powdered sugar, sifted
- 3 tbsp heavy cream (adjust for consistency)

Heat water, butter and vanilla together in a sauce pan on stovetop until melted. Remove from heat and stir in one cup cocoa. Stir in sifted powdered sugar. Stir in heavy cream, up to 3 tablespoons or more if needed to obtain the desired consistency. To ice, fill hole first, then spread icing over top and pour over sides; icing will harden as it cools.

ALIGNING OUR CLUB WITH THE SOROPTIMIST MISSION

After the last business meeting of year, President elect Becky, Service Director Janice and I toured the campus of the Coachella Valley Rescue Mission. Our intention was to have a briefing with staff on the scope of their services and to see if our club and members may have a place to assist homeless women in the community with their difficult struggle to reclaim their lives.

We were given a comprehensive tour by staff member Scott Wolf (in 122 degree heat) of the expansive buildings and grounds of the mission. We were told of the 3 programs offered at the mission.

The Gateway Program: Is a 9-12 month residential vocational/education program designed to restore people to the community as self-sustaining. Clients in this Gateway residential program are provided with food, shelter, services and case management support and participate in educational, vocational, and skills training classes to develop the tools for successful community reintegration. Towards completion of the program, their focus changes to search for steady income and acquire savings prior to transiting to permanent housing. All services are provided free of charge.

Women and Family Services: The mission provides accommodations for 60 women and their children in the Women's Family Shelter. Children must be under the age of 18.



The New Life Program: Is a faith-based, residential program for men and women seeking to change their life. Whether they have been struggling with addictions, depression or caught in the cycle of joblessness, individuals with a sincere desire to change are welcomed into this year long program. They learn to take responsibility for their actions, to re-learn values and work ethics, and to seek a new direction for their futures.

As we talked, there were many ideas going through our minds during the conversation. He told us one of their struggles is providing women with the specific items they need. They have donated soap, toothpaste, toothbrushes and men's socks all the time, but donated items specifically for women are rare.

Monthly sanitary supplies were a number one need. We explained to him that we have set up a budget item for our next club year to provide those to the mission. He was very pleased to have that information. He also said they are always in need of bras and women's panties. Becky mentioned she had access to a supply and would bring them to him. (Safehouse had a pile of these items and had no use for them.) The other item was unusual and something we would never think of on our own. Part of their mission is to assist women to find employment. Sometimes they have a struggle with their appearance because they have stopped coloring their hair. They need hair coloring products they can do themselves. Of course, if a woman has an unkempt presentation at a job interview it would hold her back.

As we spoke of their program to assist women to find employment we were very attentive. Janice said perhaps one service we could provide would be to stage mock interviewers so the women could practice for a job interview. He explained there is another group of women who bring in "career closet" clothes, accessories and makeup for the women who are ready for the job market. That was good to know.

We spoke of our "Reach for Your Dream" program that we offer through the College of the Desert and perhaps that could be adapted to their employment path program for the women. He was very interested in that idea. Scott made the statement that women are often homeless one day or less. Usually they are coming from an abusive situation. They have helped trafficked women and girls as well as those seeking to leave "the life on the streets" as a prostitute. They do have a dormitory for women with minor children. It is locked and secure. During the day the young children are taken to a free day care center. They return at the end of day. This allows the mothers the time to enter into their employment or education GED program. Each resident is required to work at some job to help run the mission.

It was an hour and half well spent for me. I was impressed with the organization of the mission and their immaculate facility. They background check all the people coming for help whether they want to stay in the mission for a night or longer. All volunteers have to go through a process and you can find out what that entails on their website.

So, here is my take about this introduction to the Mission. We as a club have an opportunity to engage with the mission to work with them assisting women to gain more education and/or a job. It is up to us now to evaluate and decide to act. As always it will take a vote of the membership to proceed or not to engage.

In my conversation with the Federation visitor at Spring Conference I told her of our new service project providing monthly sanitary supplies to the homeless women at the mission. She asked me if there was an **education component** of that project. I told her I will look into it. Now I have the answer. If the membership decides to engage with the mission's education program for women, we will have aligned ourselves with the Soroptimist International of the Americas mission of being "A global volunteer organization working to improve the lives of women and girls through programs leading to social and economic empowerment and access to education." What do you think?

Project Linus in the Valley began in 2000 and is one of the many chapters throughout the 50 states, as well as in Canada making blankets. Here in the Coachella Valley blankets are distributed to 15 organizations in the area, from 29 Palms to Coachella. To date, over 33,000 handmade blankets have been donated to area children ranging in age from newborns to teens. Some of the agencies where the blankets are distributed are Desert Regional Medical Center, Barbara Sinatra Children's Center, Marine Air Combat Hospital at 29 Palms, Shelter from the Storm, Safehouse of the Desert and Well in the Desert Homeless Shelter.

If any of you knitters/crocheters out there would like a little summer project making patches for Project Linus blankets,
