

Protocol and Procedures

Protocol and courtesy are fancy words to mean manners. Protocol is used to make everyone feel comfortable. This means starting meetings on time and keeping them moving without being dictatorial and ending on time. It means maintaining a spirit of cooperation in everything we do.

We call members by their first name. We are members—not sisters or girls. We are clubs—not chapters. We belong to a Federation—not national. We have a Pledge—not a creed or motto. The presiding officer should be addressed by her title followed by her name; i.e., President Cathie or Governor Penny, etc.

We do not use "Madam President." Don't let Parliamentary Procedures scare you. Instead, understand its role and use it wisely to keep discussion fair, open and efficient. Say what you need to say, then stop speaking. If you ever feel illequipped to participate in the group's unique style of dialogue and deliberation, remember this: Parliamentary Procedure is not intended to intimidate any one or stifle debate. Rather, it's goal is to enable deliberative bodies to practice good governance. It ensures that the will of the majority is established and the voice of the minority is protected. It should be a goal to eliminate common time wasters.

It should be every member's goal to become familiar with proper parliamentary procedure. This insures meetings run smoothly without chaos with everyone speaking at the same time without waiting to be recognized by the chair. Simple, basic rules are all that is needed in a club, but it helps to be informed enough to be able to understand what is required at a Region Conference or a Federation Convention.
