
THE TRAVELLING SOROPTIMIST

Nellie Coffman and the Desert Inn

I am in the middle of reading "Nellie's Boardinghouse" by Marjorie Belle Bright, a delightful history of an amazing pioneer woman in Palm Springs. In 1909, it took

two tortuous hours to travel from the train station near Whitewater to downtown Palm Springs in a four wheeled carriage. Nellie arrived with two small children to become an innkeeper in the desert. The beginnings of the inn were small cottages and tent houses.

From 1909 to 1913 Mrs. Coffman improved the Desert Inn to attract more and more winter residents from LA and the Midwest. Her story sounded so much like many Soroptimists I have met, in that she speaks of the "Sincerity of Service." In fact she






had the four S's of the desert – space, stillness, solitude and simplicity.

The book contains entire speeches she gave to various women's groups from Banning to Blythe. I enjoyed her Recipe for a Happy Marriage: "Give and Take, Laugh and Cry, Work and Play. And if the scales aren't even, nothing

works." She was good friends with another very famous female innkeeper named Jennie Curry, founder of Camp Curry in Yosemite Valley. Nellie called Jennie a mountain goat and Jennie called Nellie a desert rat. When Jennie tried to persuade Nellie to become a mountain goat, Nellie wrote back in a poem which expressed her feelings. In 1931 she wrote "Didn't you hear my wails when we were last on a mountain road with a driver good and true? And I yelled that the next turn would sure bring death? Why, lady, I'm ashamed of you for even suggesting such a change. As for me, I'll sure stand pat on level ground my chance I'll take and remain a Desert Rat!"

After Coffman's death in 1950, her sons sold the Desert Inn to Marion Davies, but the resort suffered from her absence. It was demolished in 1966 and replaced with the Desert Fashion Plaza, which was in turn razed in 2012. Construction is currently transforming the site into a 14-acre development that will include three hotels, a park, and an event space. Palm Springs preservationists are asking that, in addition to the now-iconic Marilyn Monroe statue, the space include room to honor this mother of Palm Springs.KCET has a short bio with photos that you can read here https://www.kcet.org/shows/lost-la/how-the-mother-of-palm-springs-transformed-a-desert-village-into-a-

WHAT'S BITCOIN? BOOM OR BUBBLE.

Fiction writers couldn't make the Bitcoin story any more fascinating if they tried. A mysterious (and still unidentified) founder. An intriguing (and complex) purchasing process. A hype leading to a market trend (or should we call it mania?) on a level not seen in years. Yet, despite this global excitement for cryptocurrencies, many are still aren't familiar with this digital payment system, and why it has recently become an extremely popular investment.

What are bitcoin? Bitcoin is a brand of encrypted electronic cash you can't put in a wallet or purse since there are no physical bills to hold. A bitcoin conceptually acts like a dollar, but with some key differences. You can hypothetically exchange it for goods and services if someone accepts it as a form of payment. Unlike traditional currency, though, Bitcoin, and other cryptocurrencies, is neither issued nor controlled by a government



or central bank. This is an appealing feature for some—the ability to send and receive payments anonymously. This is one of the reasons that most of the trading in Bitcoin so far is in Asia.

Why Bitcoin? It was the first peer-to-peer virtual currency system, meaning there's no third party facilitating the exchange. As a result of this, the initial trading in it was probably because of its use in the black market. There are other digital currencies—numbering in the thousands—but Bitcoin has received the most headlines because of its staggering increase in price last year (before it also had a significant decline.)

When Did Bitcoin explode? Bitcoin has existed virtually since 2009. After several years of ups and downs, it really took off last year when the price skyrocketed, when a Bitcoin was selling for over \$20,000 each. In the last few months, the price has declined to about \$10,000 but that's still significantly above where it was a year ago. Is it worth it? I personally find it hard to believe that valuation makes sense.

How Do You Buy a bitcoin? A number of exchanges exist around the world to facilitate buying and selling of bitcoins. Unlike the US Treasury that prints more money when it wants to put more money in circulation, Bitcoin mining creates additional units as rewards for those who keep the network of bitcoin transactions running smoothly. Mining is down through a network of user computers running special software. An average computer user doesn't have the expertise to do this, but it is big business. Every 10 minutes, it's currently estimated that 12.5 bitcoins are released to those miners. Even so, a majority of bitcoins are "owned" by a small group of investors. It's believed that 40% of them are held by about 1000 people.

So? What's the Bottom Line? Digital currencies lack regulations like other currencies. Plus, there's potential security risks. If someone steals your bitcoin, there's no one to help you recover that loss. Or, if you lose your codes to access your bitcoin, there's no one to help you get that back. In essence, there's no one to help you reset that password. In addition, competitors are introducing alternatives all the time that are many times less expensive and offer cheaper transaction fees.

Time will tell if Bitcoin is one of the biggest bubbles in history or the beginning of an important currency revolution. I think it's too early for most investors to jump in since the volatility and downside risk is too great, but if you're interested in bitcoin, do your homework before you invest!

EATYOUR VEGETABLES

BROCCOLI SALAD

1 C Miracle Whip or mayonnaise 6 T apple cider vinegar ¼ C sugar

1 chopped red onion

Bacon crumbled

Sunflower seeds
