5 Car Buying Mistakes People Make

Good financial advice includes not only making smart investment decisions, but also smart money decisions. Other than real estate, the most expensive purchase that most people make is their car.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, American households spend about \$500 per month on buying, maintaining and insuring their cars and trucks. That's \$360,000 over a typical 60 year adulthood!



Here are some costly errors that you should avoid:

- 1. Paying Cash for a Car—While I am not faulting the logic of wanting to own a car free and clear, with interest rates very low and loan approval chances very high, now is an ideal time to finance a vehicle with borrowed money. Use the cash to pay off higher interest debt or invest for longer-term goals (hopefully at higher rates than what you're borrowing at).
- 2. Buying Used Instead of New—We all know that used vehicles are generally less expensive than new and likely will depreciate more slowly, but new vehicles have several advantages. First, new vehicles are less likely to need costly repairs and they're usually covered under the warranty. Second, the loan terms for new cars are generally longer (thus lowering the payment) and many times have lower interest rates. Finally, safety features and technology on new vehicles vs. even cars of a few years old can be striking.
- 3. **Buying Instead of Leasing**—Especially if you're financing the car, leasing may make more sense than buying. When you lease, you're only financing the amount of

- the vehicle depreciation over the time you're planning on keeping it, so you normally get a smaller payment. Or, you could probably afford a more expensive car than if you buy. Leasing makes the most sense for people that want to drive a new car every 3-4 years. If you keep your cars longer, buying is still probably a better choice.
- 4. Paying with a Home Equity Line of Credit. Some people like the convenience of using an existing line of credit. It may have made sense in the past, but HELOC interest is no longer tax deductible unless you use it for home improvement, so then the decision should be based on the cheapest money rates available. These days, rates on auto loans are typically cheaper than HELOC loans, so you should check with the auto company, your credit union or bank to find out their rates before you automatically go to your available credit.
- 5. Paying More for Fuel Efficiency—Many people are interested in fuel efficient, hybrid or electric vehicles to help the environment and their pocketbooks. Unfortunately, these vehicles are many times more expensive than other less fuel efficient vehicles. Depending on how much you drive each year, factor in the initial cost and you may find that you're better off with the less fuel efficient vehicle.

Rhythms of the Resort

We decided to plan a trip to Puerto Vallarta, Mexico, after returning from a trip to Mexicali with Jess' Rotary club in January. Our neighbors



to the south rely heavily on tourism and trade with the American people and we chose to show our support of the Mexican people by spending some time and money in their country. My cleaning lady (who is from Mexicali and recently became a US citizen) thought we were crazy and was clearly worried for our safety. But the U.S. State Department gives the all clear for the tourist zones (resort areas) of Puerto Vallarta, so why worry?

There was a report a few weeks ago about two Palm Springs men who were visiting and were attacked in the early morning hours returning from a club. A lawyer once told me, "Bad things happen after midnight." Be sensible and be in your hotel by midnight. Crime statistics for Anaheim vs. PV show that more crimes are reported in the Disneyland area than in PV.

Southwest Airlines now flies direct from San Diego to PV in 2 ½ hours on Saturdays. There is a two hour time difference and roundtrip airfare is about \$300. We used points, so we just paid for taxes. Interval International gave us the incentive to visit with a certificate for one week in a two bedroom suite for just \$279. The "season" in PV is November to April and the incentive was to get "heads in beds" in May. We were told that the rainy season is from May to October. We did not see one drop of rain.

We were also warned about the "Shark Pit" at the airport. This is a room of time share tour hawkers placed between the customs area and the street where taxis are located. Just say "No!" or "No Gracias". Go straight to the taxi counter inside the terminal and purchase a ticket to your hotel. Pricing is based on distance for various zones. We were going to the new resort area of Nuevo Vallarta which is 10-15 miles north of the airport. Nuevo Vallarta has been built up over the past 15 years into a safe, beautiful area. http://www.rivieranayarit.com/destinations/nuevo-vallarta/

We stayed at the Villa del Palmar Flamingos Resort. The resort sits on Banderas Bay, and is known for its golf courses, and long, sandy Nuevo Vallarta beach.

For those of you who love pools (Doris) this one is fabulous. Multiple levels, fountains, water volleyball and entertainment by the iguanas. Did you know that iguanas are pretty swift swimmers? They routinely swam between the islands in the pools and live in the palm trees. We were content to find a shady spot under an umbrella and cozy up with a good book and a cerveza. Two for one beers all afternoon by the pool. For the adventurous, there is swimming in the ocean, paragliding and kayaking.

One morning we decided to walk north along the

sand to the closest town, Bucerias. It takes 30-40 minutes and in the hot sun with no shade, so we took a taxi back to the hotel after lunch. small town is described as what old PV was before Elizabeth Taylor discovered it. Her home on the outskirts of the southern edge of town is now a restaurant called The Iguana. If you love shopping, Bucerias has lots of small shops and stalls selling tee shirts, jewelry, and hammocks. We ate lunch at Miguel

Angel's Restaurant and Bar, where the owner welcomed us and parrots squawked happily in their cages. They have live music too.

Our one expensive excursion was a boat ride across the bay to have dinner and see the "Rhythms of the Night" show. The 45 minute ride was the most scary part of the whole week. That boat would not pass a U.S. Coast Guard inspection. We sat on the top deck in cheap plastic lawn chairs that were not secured. The middle of the bay was quite WAVY and when we were broadsided by a large wave, the chairs all

went sliding to the left. I was surprised that no one was injured. Once on land again, we were greeted by men and women in Mayan costumes. The buffet dinner was delicious and the show quite entertaining.

But I must admit, that I most enjoyed the daily Rhythm of the Resort as viewed from my balcony or pool chair. These hotels and restaurants are filled with workers who make about \$5 a day, before tips. There are hundreds of employees who make the daily bus trip into and out of the resort area. Access into Nuevo Vallarta is strictly

controlled and secure. There were 3 security check points between the door of our hotel and the main highway. Because labor is so cheap, there were workers everywhere doing all the menial tasks of keeping the hotel beautiful. Each morning around 7, the beach guys would show up and start arranging chairs, raking the sand and digging holes for the beach umbrellas which have to be taken down every afternoon when the winds pick up. Then two men would haul out the pool cleaning equipment to clean up the iguana poop and leaves that collected over night.

more men would start fanning out on the grounds hand watering the plants and hosing off the pavement. Inside hallways and the lobby, women would sweep and mop. We cringed while watching two men attempt to steady a 20 foot ladder against a pole where a rope had become entangled that was used to unfurl a canopy over an outside patio. One man's job each morning was to pull these ropes and secure the canopy before their customers arrived.

Everyone we met was kind and friendly. We plan to return. *Una mas cerveza por favor.*

APRICOT SQUARES

34 C softened butter
1 C sugar
1 large egg
1/2 tsp vanilla extract
2 C all-purpose flour
1/4 tsp baking powder
1 1/3 C sweetened shredded coconut
1/2 C chopped walnuts
1 10 or 12 oz jar apricot preserves

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

In mixer, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. In a separate bowl whisk flour and baking powder and gradually add to creamed mixture, mixing well. Fold in coconut and walnuts.

Press 2/3 of dough onto the bottom of a greased 9x13" baking pan. Spread with preserves; crumble remaining dough over preserves. Bake for 30-35 minutes, until golden brown. Cool completely in pan on wire rack. Cut into bars. Yield 2 dozen.
