
Thank you Louise for coordinating this extremely important project and thank you to all the SI Riverside members who donated to the project and thereby contributed to smiles on the faces of 60 children.



AUGUST 26, 2018 NATIONAL WOMEN'S EQUALITY DAY



NATIONAL WOMEN'S EQUALITY DAY

The United States Congress passed the 19th Amendment to the Constitution granting women full and equal voting rights on this day in 1920. Every year on August 26th, we commemorate this right with National Women's Equality Day.

Seeds were planted for the women's rights movement 80 years before when Lucretia Mott and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, while in London at the World Anti-Slavery Convention, were denied access to the convention floor. Once back in The United States, along with Martha Wright, Mary Ann McClintock and Jane Hunt, the women set in motion plans for the first woman's rights convention in Seneca Falls, New York. Held at Wesleyan Chapel on July 19-20, 1848, the conference drew 200 women the first day. On the second day, the

convention was opened to men and some did attend.

Resolved, that it is the duty of the women of this country to secure to themselves their sacred right to the elective franchise. ~ 9th Resolution of the Seneca Falls Convention 1848

During the convention, 12 resolutions were presented. These resolutions enumerated the rights of that women should be equal to men socially, economically, legally and representatively. Of the resolutions, all but the 9th were approved unanimously. It was the right to vote that many women felt would cause many of their backers to withdraw their support. However, after much debate and the support of Abolitionist Frederick Douglass, the 9th resolution passed.

Woman's suffrage would have its beginnings. Another advocate, Susan B. Anthony, joined Stanton in 1869 in creating the National Woman Suffrage Association (NWSA). Through nearly ten of persistence vears and lobbying, the NWSA introduced an amendment in 1878 and after years of debate it reached the floor of Congress in 1886, only to be defeated. It would take another 34 years, passing of batons, states entering the union with constitutions including the woman's right to vote and civil disobedience for the 19th amendment to be introduced and passed by Congress.

HISTORY

By a joint resolution of Congress on August 26, 1971, the first Women's Equality Day was celebrated. Rep. Bella Abzug (D-NY) sponsored the resolution and every year since each president declares this day as Women's Equality Day commemorating the certification of the 19th Amendment to The United States Constitution.

CLIMATE CHANGE

WHERE THINGS STAND...

Every day, on every continent, people feel the effects of climate change. A drinking water source dries up or becomes saline, reliable subsistence resources fail to thrive or disease spreads unchecked. Rains come at the wrong time of year or in unpredictable amounts resulting in crops failing or washing away. A hydropower source becomes inadequate to generate electricity permafrost melts and or Coastal infrastructure fails. erosion, flood, wildfire or rising sea level destroys all a person owns as well as their livelihood. A natural disaster forces people to migrate from their homes.

The consensus of climate scientists is that human activities are a likely cause of climatewarming trends over the past century and the complicated effects of this global climate change are causing increasingly extreme and unpredictable weather events. Recognizing the multiple threats to national security and to all aspects of sustainable development and achievement of the 2030 SDGs, nearly all UN Member States agreed to combat global

climate change by reducing and eventually eliminating greenhouse gas emissions.

The adverse effects of climate change are inextricably linked to human rights. Multiple reviews and studies identify and describe the risks climate change poses to the rights to water, food security, highest attainable standard of physical and mental health, life and physical integrity, adequate housing, sanitation, selfdetermination and sustainable development. The rights of women and girls are especially threatened by the adverse effects of climate change.

...AND WHERE THINGS NEED TO GO

FUNDAMENTAL ACTION

Responding to climate change requires mitigation (reducing emissions) and adaptation (adapting to the climate change that now). is occurrina Soroptimist International recognizes that climate change exacerbates existing pressures on communities states. and individuals everywhere and believes urgent and immediate integrated responses to climate change with strategies to protect the interests of women and girls is necessary to ensure sustainable development. By submitting country-specific reports, Soroptimist International can critically with engage the reporting and monitoring processes of UNFCCC, CEDAW, UPR, the Sendai Framework and the 2030 Sustainable Development Agenda thus ensuring the voices of women and girls are heard and inducing governments to act.

ADDITIONAL ACTION

Governments, non-governmental organizations, civil society, the private sector and other institutions and individuals who interact with women and girls must act in the following areas toward mitigation of and adaptation to climate change:

- Raise Awareness of Climate Chanae: No woman or airl is immune to the reach of the effects of climate change no matter how subtle or dramatic the environmental shift may be. Training programs and capacitybuilding that target women and support their role implementing climate in mitigation and adaptation policy give women and girls an awareness of what climate change is and how to adapt one's life to a changing environment which in turn gives women and girls power to recognize and chose options that improve their situation.
- Conduct Research and Collect Monitoring, and Use Disaggregated Data: Systems to collect accurate and reliable qualitative and quantitative data that are disaggregated by place, gender, ethnicity, age, language, marital status and other descriptors that are relevant to monitoring inequalities experienced by women and girls must be developed and uniformly implemented to assist development of climatechange related policies, laws and plans and when designing, monitoring and evaluating projects that provide aid and services to women and girls.
- Provide Education and Access to Decent Work: Natural disasters disproportionately worsen earnings and the employment opportunities of women. Livelihoods may be lost in a single disastrous event. However, the insidious creep of temperature, precipitation or sea level may present circumstances that slowly steal employment and

entrepreneurial opportunities. Educational programs should eauip women and girls with knowledge, skills and flexibility to move to new or different employment or entrepreneurial opportunities as circumstances change.

WHERE SOROPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL STANDS

These are the principles that Soroptimist International strongly supports and will advocate for on behalf of women and girls:

- States should fully implement their Paris Agreement of COP21 commitments, to prevent global temperatures from rising and compromising a vast range of human rights.
- States, the private sector and NGOs should take care to protect the rights of women and girls and empower them to be leaders, experts and agents of change.
- States, the private sector and NGOs should provide for effective remedies to climate-related violations of human rights.
- States, the private sector and NGOs should assess and provide information about the effects of climate change to allow climate related decisions to be made with the participation of an informed public.
- Each State should adopt a legal and institutional framework that assists those within its jurisdiction to adapt to the unavoidable adverse effects of climate change.
- States must protect the rights of freedom of expression and association in relation to all climate actions, even

when the rights are being exercised in opposition to supported projects by government entities.

For the first time, every country in the world has pledged to curb emissions, strengthen resilience and join in a common cause to take common climate action. The Live Your Dream Scholarship is awarded to outstanding high school seniors who attended SI Riverside's "Live Your Dream -Dream It Be It" Conference in their AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) middle school years.

The "Live Your Dream - Dream It Be It" Conference is an all day event designed to introduce 7th and 8th grade girls to various career opportunities and the way to achieve career goals with workshops provided by successful women in many different professions.

Sandra Cheng has a grade point average of 3.97 at Martin Luther King High School and her activities include Professional Arts Conservatory, PAWW'S, Senior Committee, Christian Club, King High School Remembers, Pay It Forward and AVID in addition to volunteering for the children's ministry program at her church and taking part as a missionary on trips to San Francisco and Spain.

Gillian Burns has a grade point average over 4.0 (ranked 11th in her class of 456 students) at Ramona High School and her activities include Student Class President, Cheer Squad Captain, Mock Trial, Link Crew and AVID. With temperatures predicted in the 100's, SI Riverside distribution volunteers were grateful to ATA Executive Director Ofelia Ortega for securing the Arlanza Community Center for our July 31, 2018 event.

As in past years, the ATA Backpack project was truly a team effort with many SI Riverside members staying after the July 24th program meeting to fill the backpacks with school supplies: Crayons, markers, pencils and sharpeners, pens, erasers, glue sticks, rulers, pocket folders, dividers, staplers, composition books, toothbrushes, and either wide ruled or college ruled notebook paper.

Thank you to all the members who donated money, purchased supplies, stuffed packs or volunteered on the distribution day.

Jeanne Hatcher and Louise Borda stored the backpacks at their homes until the July 31st event.

Jeanne, Louise, Ellen Clizbe and Linda Robertson arrived at the Community Center at 11:15 AM the day of the event. Ofelia Ortega, Director of ATA and her daughter, Vanessa, Assistant Director, were already on hand ready to begin distribution to the assembled families.

60 packs were distributed to children from kindergarten through high school. Some of the children brought handmade cards to share with Soroptimist and many children and parents personally thanked us for supporting them and their children. However, Inspire has 5 other houses in Riverside and San Bernardino County. The following is an update from Inspire regarding new residents at the other houses:



New students tend to need more time and attention, so June has been a very full month for our staff and some amazing volunteers. The new students are feeling welcomed and are thankful to be part of a caring community.



SI RIVERSIDE'S HISTORY





DECEMBER 1976: History Walk Dedication at Raincross Square

CONCEPTION OF THE BICENTENNIAL HISTORY WALK

In February 1975, Soroptimist International of Riverside Virginia president, Moore. **Bicentennial** appointed а Committee to create a Bicentennial project for the club. The committee consulted the city's Bicentennial chairman, Rov Staylor, who presented a number of ideas including a History Walk.

The committee decided on a History Walk to be placed in the Forest of Lights Plaza in Raincross Square where the Ben H. Lewis Hall was under construction. On March 3, 1975, the club officially accepted the committee's recommendation. The committee consulted with Mayor Ben H. Lewis and the Riverside Bicentennial Commission who enthusiastically endorsed the proiect. Preliminary inquiries were made of Tom Patterson, author of "Landmarks of Riverside" and "A Colony for California," Robert E. Brown, of Brown and Rawdon, architects for the Ben H. Lewis Hall, and Don Hagen owner of Riverside the Monumental Company.

Mr. Patterson agreed to donate his services to the community project for the research and text for a descriptive booklet, Bob Brown to prepare the design of the walk and to work with the city's Raincross Square Coordinator, Herb Barnett, and the contractor, Del Webb Corporation, in preparing the eighteen inch round spaces before the cement was poured in the plaza and Don Hagen for his expertise on the selection of the best material for the stones and to provide the finished stones at a nominal cost.

On November 17, 1975, the club's new president, Rocky Pollitz, appeared before the Municipal Arts Commission for approval of this project. It was unanimous that space be made available in the Forest of Lights Plaza and that the final drawings be submitted for the Commission's approval. On February 3, 1976, Mayor Ben H. Lewis submitted a report of this project to the City Council.

Everything was progressing beautifully except the project did not have an artist. It was asking a great deal of someone to donate services for such an extensive project. However, on April 2, 1976, Bette Fauth, Assistant Professor of the Art Department of Riverside City College, was approached and agreed to undertake the art work. She was excited about the idea and the challenge. On June 21, 1976, President Rocky Pollitz again made a presentation to the Municipal Arts Commission. The first drawing and the rough idea for the other twenty-nine drawings were approved.

The next hurdle was to print a booklet describing the history of each stone. In helping Bette Fauth with the research on Stone Number 23, Mr. Frank Lewis of A. M. Lewis, Inc., became interested in the project. He offered his services as photographer and A. M. Lewis, Inc. agreed to print the first five hundred copies of the History Walk booklet.

On Tuesday, December 7, 1976, the completed History Walk was dedicated and presented to the City of Riverside. The Ribbon Cutting Ceremony was performed by three Soroptimist International of Riverside presidents: Virginia Moore 1973-75, Rocky Pollitz 1975-76 and Elissa Fruciano 1976-77.

On April 10, 1998, in recognition of the 50th Anniversary of the chartering of Soroptimist International of Riverside, the History Walk was re-dedicated and once again presented to the City of Riverside.

Leadership Tip: Conflict Resolution

It's just a fact of life – conflicts will happen. We have them at home, at work and we even have them in our very own Soroptimist clubs. Because we are global organization, we have a diverse membership with unique ways of working, thinking and speaking.

Differences are bound to occur and conflicts will arise. If they aren't met head on, they can keep us from being successful. How so? Conflicts impact teamwork and divert focus away from our mission – two of the top qualities members' value most about being a Soroptimist. Conflict rarely resolves itself. While most people do not enjoy conflict, if left unchecked (or handled poorly), destructive actions can escalate into an even bigger problem, the least being hurt feelings and spiteful behavior.

That being said, conflict isn't all negative. It can bring about new ideas, serve as a learning experience and help hone communication and our skills. Differing interpersonal opinions can bring about innovations that like-minds can't visualize, look the at opportunities and leverage conflict as a way to build your team, develop leaders, promote transparency, boost retention and demonstrate value - just to name few!

The next time you have to referee a dispute between members (and unfortunately, at some point you will) first take a deep breath! Then use the following tips to help you work your way through the challenging situation so a positive resolution and closure can be obtained.

<u>Handle confrontation ASAP</u>. We can't prevent it, but we can minimize it by catching it in its early stages. Take the time to immediately identify and understand the brewing tension to avoid a massive flare up in the future. Minimize the severity by dealing with the conflict quickly so it doesn't fester and grow.

Be prepared. Go on a fact finding mission and discover the real source of the conflict. This enables you to address the true cause of the situation (sifting out hearsay and gossip). anv questions and Ask request clarification when necessary. Most importantly, take the time to evaluate and digest what you find.

<u>Calmly</u> communicate. Talk privately with the people involved and hold group meetings about the problem out of the public eye. Have a peaceful, constructive discussion while sticking to the issue at hand. Get to the point quickly and keep to the facts in order to maintain focus and avoid emotional outbursts.

Listen. Remember that hearing and listening are different. Listening requires focus. Fight the urge to interrupt people and let them speak their opinions and thoughts. Be present in conversations, remove outside distractions, pay attention to body language and seek clarification by asking questions.

Be objective. Put yourself in each of the conflicting party's shoes to understand their motivations and perspectives. Practice being free from prejudices and showing favoritism. A thoughtful and balanced attitude goes a long way and can make all the difference in the world.

Find a solution. Brainstorm options and identify solutions. Be flexible, listen and consider the alternatives. Clearly communicate the next steps and/or the final outcome so there are no questions or room for misinterpretations. Whenever possible, negotiate the outcome. Everyone wants a win-win and compromise gives everyone a sense of satisfaction.

Despite its bad reputation, conflict is inevitable and is necessary for us to grow and progress. Even leaving a minor disagreement unchecked can trickle over into the entire membership and adversely affect a club's or region's atmosphere. By being proactive, you diminish any can growing "explosions."

The next time the temperature rises among members, put the above tips into practice. Every conflict is different and the results will vary depending on each situation. But, the better able you are at resolving conflicts, the better able you will be at leading a productive group of members who can work together to accomplish our mission.
