

#### Soroptimist International (SI) Emblem

The emblem is a circular disc on which the figure of a woman appears as the central figure. she emerges as the "spirit of womanhood"--vital, steadfast and dauntless. A plaque bearing the name "Soroptimist" is held in her upraised arms. The leaves and acorns of the oak bend downward to the right from the word "Soroptimist" and are emblematic not only of the strength and growth of the organization, but the progress and achievements that it will attain. The leaves of the laurel are on the left of the word "Soroptimist." Laurel is renowned as the symbol of victory and typifies friendship and success, both of which are vital to club life. The word "International" forms the lower portion of the emblem and signifies the worldwide institution that Soroptimist has become. Our emblem is more than just a badge of identification; it is a symbol of the aims and ideals of Soroptimists everywhere.



#### Soroptimist International of the Americas (SIA) Logo

In 2004, SIA conducted a marketing research study in which participants indicated there was a need to update/modernize the Soroptimist "look." This led to the creation and adoption by SIA of the "S" logo to project the qualities of a contemporary and relevant organization. This "S" logo replaces the Soroptimist emblem as the official pin for all members of the SIA federation. The "S" logo is a simple, stylish graphic representation of the modern Soroptimist organization intended to foster brand unity in today's environment. All SIA clubs are encouraged to use the "S" logo on their materials.

#### A Note on Sunsetting the SI Emblem

Soroptimist International of the Americas (SIA) no longer uses the Soroptimist International (SI) emblem on its materials, as it has limited appeal—particularly among younger women and women of diverse nationalities. The SIA Board of Directors issued a logo policy calling for all clubs to cease use of the SI emblem by the end of 2019.

Having a strong visual identity is a key part of our branding strategy. It is important that all levels of our organization use the "S" logo consistently, and not alter its look in any way. When clubs and regions create unique or different logos for local use, it interferes and competes with the overall Soroptimist brand. Having a consistent visual identity is essential to successful branding efforts, which affects SIA's ability to increase our recognition, recruit members and fundraise outside our organization.

# SOROPTIMIST LIVE YOUR DREAM: Education and Training Awards for Women

Soroptimist's *Live Your Dream: Education and Training Awards for Women* assist women who provide the primary source of financial support for their families by giving them the resources they need to improve their education, skills and employment prospects.

Every year, Soroptimist distributes more than \$2 million in education grants to about 1,500 women all over the world. Over half of our *Live Your Dream Awards* recipients are survivors of domestic violence, trafficking or sexual assault. Nearly all of the women and families we serve have overcome enormous obstacles including poverty, teen pregnancy, and drug or alcohol addiction.

Live Your Dream Awards recipients may use the cash award to offset any costs associated with their efforts to attain higher education, such as books, childcare, tuition and transportation. This unique program is helping women find their voice and purpose while offering the resources they need to succeed.

Our sincere **Condolences** to <u>Ginger Eaton</u> and the Eaton Family. Services were held at the Montclair Senior Center on Aug. 18. In lieu of flowers, the Family requests donations be made to the Reeder Heritage Foundation (c/o 5560 Cambridge St., Montclair, CA 91763). Mayor Eaton was elected to Montclair City Council in 1988 and in 1995 he was appointed Mayor. He was the longest-serving mayor in Montclair and the Inland Valley. Mayor Paul will always be remembered as <u>SI Montclair/Inland Valley</u>'s very special "Soropti-Friend."

✓ <u>President Virginia</u> says "Thank You SI M/IV" for making the 2017-18 "President's Gift" a club donation to Pathways/Africa which fits the Soroptimist International Goodwill & Understanding area of service. The Festival will celebrate visual and performing arts with artist booths, art demonstrations and instruction, maker machines, display of historical artifacts and ephemera, mini walking tour of Arts District historic buildings, and live musical performances.

The event will be in the east end of the Ontario Arts District, 200 block of South Lemon Ave., near the Ontario Museum of History & Art and the CCMA.

✓ **Labor Day** in the U.S. is a public holiday celebrated on the first Monday in September. It honors the American labor movement and the contributions that workers have made to the strength, prosperity, laws and well-being of the country. It is the Monday of the long weekend known as **Labor Day Weekend** and it is considered the unofficial end of summer in the United States. It is recognized as a federal holiday.

Beginning in the late 19th century, as the trade union and labor movements grew, trade unionists proposed that a day be set aside to celebrate labor. "Labor Day" was promoted by the Central Labor Union and the Knights of Labor, which organized the first parade in New York City. In 1887, Oregon was the first state of the United States to make it an official public holiday. By the time it became an official federal holiday in 1894, thirty states in the United States officially celebrated Labor Day.
