INTRODUCTION

Clap your hands! It makes quite a noise, doesn't it? If everyone in your club claps their hands, the noise is even greater. Now try to imagine over 90,000 members - over 3,000 clubs in over 124 countries - clapping their hands - it's awesome. Picture now those same hands stretched out in service - 180,000 hands! There is so much we can do, when we do it together.

It starts with you - with your hands, your service. You belong to a club - Soroptimist International of Somewhere, Golden West Region, Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc., Soroptimist International. Within that club, you work for the goas of service in your community, your region, your federation, and through Soroptimist International. Soroptimist International and our Federation are, among other things, official consultants to the United Nations. This makes it possible to join withyet even more hands across the world!

But back to you - to your hands. You are an importantnember of your club - essential toits' success. The diversity of personalities, backgrounds, knowledge and interests of all the individual Soroptimists all over the world give yet another dimension - brain and soul (or call it love). If you become negligent in your attendance - if you don't work on the club ways and means projects - then your club, your region, your federation, and the extended fellowship of Soroptimist International all lose out. It's alot to think about, isn't it?

CLUB

The most important component of the entire structure is the *club*. Here we have the grass roots and the foundation of Soroptimism. In all of the federations, clubs are organized with at least 5 qualified executive business and professional women w ho meet the membership and classification requirements.

Each club receives a *charter* at the time it is established and retains that charter as long as all of the requirements of higher law are fulfilled. Each club operates through the *Soroptimist International Constitution, Federation Bylaws and Procedures, RegionBylaws/ Standing Rules/Procedures, and <i>Club Bylaws and Standing Rules* Club procedures meet local requirements, but must not conflict with higher law.

The *Board of Directors* of the club has administrative control over the affairs, funds, and property of the club <u>except</u> that of modifying any action taken by the club. The resident, as chief executive officerof the club, appoints all standing and special committees. The club elects *delegates*, in addition to the President who is usually a delegate.

Within the club, rules and guidelines are set to guarantee that the will of the majority is carried out, without violating the rights of the individual. In order to maintain the diversity, which is so important to the organization, each club is controlled by means of classification *Membership is by invitation only*it is an honor and a joy to join with Soroptimists all over the world to show we care.

DISTRICTS

For the purposes of holding *fall meetings* in the months of October and November, the clubs are grouped into *geographical districts*. Each *district* elects one *district director* to the Regional Board, who then represents the clubs in that *district* on the Board, and makes visits to those clubs during the biennium.

REGIONS

In order to join together in service, a regional level of service was developed. There are currently 28 regions in Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc. Our Golden West Region is one of these. Regions have conferences. The Region Conference is set up as the policy-making body of the region. It establishes financial policies, makes rules for carrying on regional business, and elects the officers and members of the Region Board. Each region supplies leadership to the clubs by assisting in the development of new clubs, and providing education for all. It provides control over boundaries, policies, and some of the necessary fees and dues. The region Governor sits on the International Board of Soroptimists as a programme delegate. Most important of all, Golden West figure provides inspiration by promoting the objects as stated by the Federation. With 62 clubs, this is no small job!

Golden West Region allows*three voting delegates* from each club to conference. These delegates are the accredited delegates of each club *in good standing*. To be in good standing, a club must have paid its region and federation obligations, and must maintain 15 active members.

The officers of our Golden West Region are: Governor, Governor-elect, Secretary, Treasurer, and four District Directors (elected from each of the four districts of the region). The Region Board is the administrative body of the region.

FEDERATION

Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc. (SIA) is one of the four federations within Soroptimist International. The others are:

Soroptimist International of Europe Soroptimist International of Great Britain and Ireland Soroptimist International of the Southwest Pacific

Currently, there are 36,212 members in 1,404 clubs in 19 countries in SIA, which holds conventions biennially, and may hold additional self-supporting meetings during the odd years.

SIA underwent a dramatic change in 1990 with the passage of a *plan for restructuring*. In this new plan, mail ballots replaced convention voting, and the Federation Board was drastically reduced from 33 (6 executive officers elected at-large at conventions and 27 regional governors who served as Board Members) to 13 Board Members elec ted for rotating two-year terms from *Electoral Areas* representative of the countries and languages of our Federation. The Board of Directors conducts, manages and directs the business and affairs of our Federation. The 14 (in 2004, Chair of the Fund Development Council was added to the board) members include a President, President-elect, and a Secretary-Treasurer. The President-elect is elected by all the clubs of the Federation from within this 13 14 member board, and the Secretary/Treasurer is elected by the Federation Board at its irst board meeting each year. The Federation Board also im plements the decisions reached in mail ballots, provides control over regional boundaries, fees and dues, policies and programs, and promotes the *five identifying programs – the Violet Richardson Award (VRA), the Wom en's Opportunity Award (WOA), Soroptimist Club Grants for Wom en and Girls, Soroptim ist Workplace Campaign to end Domestic Violence, and Making A Difference for Women (MADFW).*

It is at *Federation Conventions* that the development and reinforcement of Soroptimist objects is addressed - and your club is a part of it through its *Federation Club Delegate*. The club has the privilege and the responsibility to send one delegate to vote and speak for its members at the *Convention* of the Federation. The Convention is held every two years in even-numbered years. In addition to the club delegates, Federation Board members, Federation Past Presidents, and regional governors vote.

The *Bylaws* of the Federation may be amended by a two-thirds mail ballot of clubs, after the matter has been presented to the Federation Convention for discussion and amendment by voting delegates at the Biennial Convention.

SOROPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL

Soroptimist International is the *top organizational level* in Soroptimist. Clubs are represented in Soroptimist International through the Federation (and regions/unions). Soroptimist International extends to 124 countries - 3,000+ clubs with approximately 90,000+ members.

Soroptimist International *Conventions are quadrennial* (every four years in the odd year)- in 2007 the Convention was in Glasgow, Scotland. At International, policies and pogrammes of service are set in which we all join hands.

Even though federations have been in existence since 1928, there was no formal structure for Soroptimist International until 1952. At present, there are *four officers: an International President, Treasurer, President-elect, and Im mediate Past President*. They all serve for two years. The President and Treasurer are elected in rotation from the four Federations. The President-elect is elected by mail ballot three months prior to the Interim Board Meeting in the current biennium. The President-elect resigns from any other Federation office upon election, thereupon serving as President-elect.

The *International Board* consists of the officers of Soroptimist International, the President of each Federation, and two representatives selected in accordance with the procedures each Federation. For instance, SIA law requires the three representatives to be: the President in office, the President-elect and one other Soroptimist elected by the Board.

At the moment, the *International Constitution* allows each delegation to bring one or two people to act as consultants, to help write official motions, and to look up references to past minutes, the "Record of Decisions" and the Constitution. In addition, the following may attend: the Programme Co-ordinators; the International Representatives Liaison; the Procedural Consultant, the Programme Liaison, the Extension Co-ordinator; the chairs of Standing Technical Committees; such chairs of special committees and such other persons as the Pres ident may from time to time invite. At the meeting of the Board held at the time of the International Convention, a delegate from each region or union, and a delegate from each club or group of clubs established by, or associated with, a Federation and not within a region or union may attend.

On all matters of policy, management, and programme of Soroptimist International, the President of each Federation and thetwo representatives from each Federation are the onlyvoting members of the Board. The exception to this is that at the Bard Meeting preceding Convention, each delegate who is present has one vote in the adoption of any item of programme of Soroptimist International. At all other times, other members in attendance have a voice but no vote *International Board meetings* are held once a year, unless it is deemed necessary to hold them at additional times.



STRUCTURE OF THE OTHER FEDERATIONS

SOROPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL OF EUROPE (SIE)

Soroptimist International of Europe has *unions* as opposed to our regions. The union holds at least one meeting a year. The clubs send two voting delegates to the union to which the club belongs. Each country with three clubs is entitled to have a union.

The Union is composed of the *Council of Delegates and the Board*. The Council of Delegates administers the union, elects the President of the union and other members of the Board, and elects two active members, either present delegates or past delegates of their Council of Delegates, to represent the union at meetings of the *Committee of Governors* of the Federation. The Committee of Governors is the voting body for this Federation.

SOROPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND (SIGB&I)

This Federation has *divisional unions* in place of our regions and SIE's unions. Every member of a Soroptimist club is a member of the Federation. For purposes of unity of clubs, extension, and to promote the objects of Soroptimism, the clubs in the British Commonwealth and other countries within the Federation are segregated into the divisional unions.

The divisional unions, in turn, elect two representatives to the *Executive Committee*. The Executive Committee is the Federation's voting unit. Clubs, however, have a direct voice in ratifying certain actions of the Executive Committee at the annual Federation *Conference* (convention).

National Councils are established within countries of the Federation for the same purposes as divisional unions and also to provide a link with governmental and other national or provincial bodies. Area Councils comprised of any group of countries within the territorial limits of the Federation may also be established.

SOROPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL OF THE SOUTH WEST PACIFIC (SISWP)

Clubs in this Federation are assigned to *regions*, and all clubs are members of the Federation. Two members from each club, elected by the club, serve on the *Regional Council* of their area. The Regional Council holds an *Annual General Meeting* at which all members of clubs within the region may attend. The voting delegates of the club in attendance at a Regional Council meeting elect the officers of the region (except the secretary) and also elect two delegates from the region to the *Federation Council*. The regional Secretary is appointed on the recommendation of the Regional President with the approval of the Council. Only club delegates are entitled to vote at meetings of the Regional Council.

The Federation Council consists of the Federation officers and the two elected delegates from each Regional Council.

Soroptimist International of the South West Pacific has its *Conference* (convention) biennially. Club delegates vote on the issues at conference; if they are unable to attend, they may vote by proxy.

So there you have it- this is the structure of Soroptimist, built bythe hands of Soroptimists during the past 90 years. Quite an organization, isn't it? And it all started with you, a member of an individual club - with your hands, your talents, your caring. Use those hands to build and create - have those hands present at club, district, region and federation meetings. With your help, we will meet the goals of International Goodwill and Understanding . . . and the Adancement of the Status of Women all over the world. SOROPTIMIST - the best of or for women - if we make it that way!

HISTORY OF GOLDEN WEST REGION THIS HISTORY BEGINS

In the spring of 1921, Mr. Stuart Morrow, a profesional organizer for men's serviceclubs, called upon a secretarial school to interestA. E. Goddard in joining such a club. To his surprise, he found delaide E. Goddard, who expressed interest in having a classified service club for women.

Thus began the Soroptimist Club of Alameda County. It was chartered on *October 3, 1921*, with 80 founder members. The Charter President was Violet Richardson, later to become Mrs. Ward. The name *Soroptimist* was chosen and incorporated by Mr. Morrow.

After chartering clubs in Canada, England, and France, Mr. Morrow incorporated the *International Association of Soroptimist Clubs*. By 1927, eight of the existing clubs, representing 602 members, met and voted to purchase all rights to Soroptimist Clubs from Mr. Morrow for a total price of \$5,500.00. This sum, which amounted to \$9.25 per member, was raised in 30 days with money from England, France, Canada, and the United States.

Soroptimism progressed rapidly, becoming a worldwide organization with *four federations*. *Districts* became *regions* and the name *Southwestern Region* was given to the Founding area.

By 1952, Southwestern Region had 118 clubs, and was divided into Southwestern and Pacific Regions. *Pacific Region* was the fourteenth region in the *American Federation*, which is now called *Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc.* The late Mary Ellen Pangle of Riverside, California, was Charter Governor. The new Region had about 500 members in 67 clubs in Southern California, Southern Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico, and Mexico and covered 227,716 square miles. Later, Mexico was dropped and two clubs in Texas were added.

By 1978, Pacific Region had 154 clubs with over 5,000 members, and was divided int Desert Coast, Camino Real, and Golden West Regions . In the words of Miss Mary Ellen Pangle: "From the beginning decisions were made together, leadership developed and accepted, service sought and given with eagerness - these made Pacific Region great. Now the next move. We do not divide; we multiply. Long live the spirit of Pacific Region!"

Golden West Region was formed with about 1,700 members, in 56 clubs, covering an area of 25,980 square miles. It had a beginning allotmenbf \$8,352.00 from Pacific Region. The territorial linits were as follows:

"San Bernardino and Riverside Counties in California; Arizona, except Yura; New Mexico; the city of El Paso, and the surrounding territory in Texas not to exceed the distance of 75 m iles from the city of El Paso and the city of Farwell, Texas; and that portion of Nevada adjacent to Bullhead City, Arizona."

CONFERENCES

In the beginning biennium, it was decided that two Conferences be held per year: one in the spring, and one in the fall. The first Conference, ostessed by SI of Flagstaff, was held in Flagstaff, Arizona at the Little America Hotel in October 1978, with 325 members in attendance.

The second Conference, hostessed by SI of San Bernardino, was held in San Bernardino, California, in April 1979. The Convention Center was the site of the meetings and the Hilton Hotel provided accommodations for the 335 members in attendance.

The third Conference was held in El Paso, Texas, in October, 1979, at the Holiday Inn, with 263 members in attendance. Hostess club SI of El Paso said, "Let's Be Amigos" and concluded the Conference with an optional tour of Juarez, Mexico.

The final Conference of the first biennium of Golden West Region was held at Giswold's in Claremont, California in April 1980. SI of Ontario was the hostess club. The special theme of the Conference was "Fiesta of the Bells." Governor Lucile and the Charter Board of Golden West Region were toasted by the many bells rung by the 398 members in attendance.

CONFERENCE ACTION

The first item of business for the new Region was to adopt the Golden West Regional Record, which:

- divided the Region into six geographical divisions rather than establishing districts.
- assigned the regional officers and board members as liaison officers to each of the newly formed divisions.
- established a charter fee of \$3.00 per member of each new club chartered.
- established that the Regional Board select the meeting sites for conferences frominvitations by the clubs.
- established a mandatory club fee of \$15.00 for fall meetings with the registration fee to be decided by the Board.
- established holding one regional Conference in the spring of each year.
- established regional participation in the Foundations Youth Seminars (now Youth Forum) program.
- established a \$5.00 registration fee for all Soroptimists attending Conferences.
- established a mandatory \$1.00 fee per member of Golden West Region, including Life and Honorary members, to be placed in the Regional Service Fund to be used for SYCA and TAP Awards.
- established an ad hoc committee of three members, each to represent one of the three combined divisions, to study all aspects of districting Golden West Region.

As the result of a regional contest, each past Governor of Golden West Region was granted the privilege of using the title "DONA". This title is revered in Spanish heritage but was given the translation of "Don't Offer Needless Advice." Charter Governor Lucile E. Toller, SI of Parker, AZ became DONA Lucile.

CONFERENCES

The **1981 Spring Conference** "Ascending to New Heights," hostesæd by SI of Albuquerque, was held at the Hilton Inn in Albuquerque, NM on May 1-2, whi 424 enthusiastic Soroptimists and guests ready to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the founding of Soroptimist in 1921.

On Friday night, many showed they remembered the "Flapper Days" with appropriate dress and many Charleston steps as they paraded across the stage.

A tableau of "Soroptimist Heritage" was written and narrated by Pam DeAtley of SI of Needles, CA. Nine presidents of clubs in the region portrayed important haracters in Soroptimist history. REGALs Dottie Kissinger, Brigitte Page and Maxine Parsons and DONA Lucile Toller portrayed themselves.

The **1982 Spring Conference** "Ascending to New Heights - with New Leaders," hostessed by SI of Saguaro Foothills, was held at the Carefree Inn in Carefree, AZ on April 30-May 1. Attendance continued to grow with 470 Soroptimists attending the Conference.

At the close of the final Conference of the biennium Carefree, GovernorLeOra presented her report on the state of the Region under the heading, "Miracles are Hard Work." The "Miracles" that were performed by the members of Golden West Region took many avenues: the appointment of Sandra Day O'Connor of SI of Phoenix to the United States Supreme Court; appointment of legislative advocates from the states in our region; and the "Mracle" of clubs working together as evidenced by the establishment of the House of Hope.

CONFERENCE ACTION

Golden West Region <u>Procedures</u> and <u>Record</u> were edited so that the <u>Record</u> contained only Board action and the <u>Procedures</u> contained all Conference Action. In other action, the delegates:

- eliminated reading of the Treasurer's Report and Budget at Conference.
- established that the Regional Board would select Conference sites two years in advance.
- established the Youth Citizenship AwardsProgram, Training Awards Program andWomen Helping Women Program as the identifying projects of Golden West Region.
- established Regional dues of \$5.00 per member except Life and Honorary members.
- established a yearly registration fee of \$15.00 to be paid by each club for their three delegates to Conference.
- established that each club pay \$15.00 for each fall meeting.
- established that the Regional Board shall set the registration fee for each member attending a fall meeting.
- established a travel pool.
- resolved that a Legislative Advocate would be appointed each biennium for each state represented in Golden West Region.

- resolved that donations held in the Regional Service Fund for the Health Care Facility be used to finance the ad hoc committee as well as start-up costs after the approval of the regional Conference delegates and that the adhoc committee make afull report at the 1983 Conference in Palm Springs, CA.
- decided to form an ad hoc committee to study the request from SI of Ontario (CA) club to leave Golden West Region and join the Desert Coast Region.

The **1983 Spring Conference**, hostessed by SI of Palm Springs, was heldat the Hilton Riviera Hotel in Palm Springs, CA on April 29-30 under the special theme, "Sun, Fun and Service." Conference enthusiasm brought together a record 520 delegates, members and guests.

Governor Petty Zimmerman served as an ex-officio member of the board. Each club in Golden West Region was encouraged to have a representative on the Advisory Council. Bylaws were approved, and the Care Board started procedures for incorporation and tax-exempt status. In other action, the delegates:

- established that one Board Member would be elected from and represent each ofhe three combined divisions.
- established that each club pays an annual registration fee of \$50.00 plus \$1.00 per active member for the spring Conference, fall meeting and leadership workshops combined.
- agreed that the Regional Board resolves territorial disputes between or among clubs.
- established guidelines for the person and the payment for Golden West Region's representative to the International Convention each quadrennium.

The **1991 Spring Conference** was held at the Marriott Desert Springs June 7-8 with a theme of "Resort to the Desert." Hostess clubs were SI's oCathedral City, CoachellaValley, Conchilla, Desert Hot Springs, Joshua Tree, La Quinta, Palm Desert, Palm Desert-Sunrise, Palm Springs, Rancho Mirage, Twentynine Palms, and Yucca Valley.

PRESIDENT'S RETREAT

The Presidents Retreat was initiated to provide incoming club presidents with leadership training, resources, and the opportunity to network with other club presidents. The 1996 Presidents Retreat was held on July 26-27 in Phoenix, Arizona, with 89 participants. The 1997 Presidents Retreat was held on July 25-26 in Ontario, California, with 83 participants.

SOROPTIMIST DAY AT THE LEGISLATURE (ARIZONA)

The third annual Arizona Soroptimist Day of Legislation (SDL III) was held on January 29, 1997 in Phoenix. Sixty-six Soroptimists and friends gathered to study the main issues facing the Arizona state legislature during the 1997 legislative session; a more equitable method of funding education and planning for the aging population. SIA President D&Nickerson attended SDL III and a reception in her honor was held the previous evening.

Arizona Soroptimist Day of Legislation IV was expanded to a two-day event and began with a visit to the state capitol/legislature and dinner for women legislators sponsored by SI ofPhoenix on January 29, 1998. The following day participants heard from I egislators, lobbyists, and a TV investigative reporter about current health topics to be considered by the state legislature; the Governor's proposa to use tobacco tax money to provide healthcare for children of the working poor (Kid's Care), alternative medicine, and personal and environmental health issues.

SOROPTIMIST LEGISLATIVE WORKSHOP (CALIFORNIA)

The 1997 Soroptimist Legislative Workshop was held on March 16-18at the Capitol Plaza Holiday Inn in Sacramento, California. The workshop included speakers on domestic violence, trafficking of women in third world countries, nutrition and cancer prevention, the mental aging process, and a presentation by Assemblywoman Sheila Kuehl discussing current legislative issues.

The 1998 Soroptimist Legislative Workshop was held on March 2-24 at the Capitol Plaza Holiday Inn in Sacramento, California. The workshop included a panel discussion on land mines moderated by Past International President Patsy Daniels and preentations by representatives from the Senate and Theresa A. Loer, Senior Coordinator for International Women's Issues for the U.S. State Department and Director of the President's Inter-Agency Council on Women.

GOLDEN WEST REGION FRIENDSHIP GRANT

Deanny Fremaux, SI of Reims, France, SI Federation of Europe, was the first recipient of the Golden West Region Friendship Grant, a new Regional project under the IGU Program of Service area. Deanny was hosted by the 19 clubs in District 3. During her three weeks the Golden West Region, May-June 1997, each club had the opportunity of meeting Deanny, either individually or collectively. During these meetings, Deanny shared the service, fundraising, and social activities of her club in Reims. The District 3 clubs reciprocated by sharing their projects with her. Deanny was esponsible for her airfare to and from the Golden West Region. Home hospitality, intra-region travel, and recreational activities were provided by the hosting clubs.

- **INDEX 7** to delete all Standing Rules due to being unnecessary or duplicated in other sections of the bylaws and procedures.
- **INDEX 8** to amend Finance, Number 14 a. & b., Golden West Region Procedures to read that general fund surplus funds shall be allocated 60% to the service fund and 40% to the general fund to be used in addition to the current operating expense budget, as needed, beginning in the 2010-2012 biennium.
- **INDEX 9** to amend Finance, Number 16, Golden West Procedures to dissolve the designated accounts for legislative workshops and utilize the funds for additional operating expenses in the 2010-2012 biennium.

- **Objective 5**. Address the specific needs of women and girls by improving environmental sustainability, and mitigating effects of climate change and disasters. Of 8 reports submitted (4.5%), SI Desert Tucson: Life is Rich received the award.

GOAL 2: Soroptimist International will be a global voice for increasing access to education and leadership for women and girls.

- INDEX #1 Amendment to the Region Bylaws, Article V Elections, Section 5.2. Voting shall be by ballot. The GWR Governor shall appoint tellers, who are not delegates, to oversee the election and count the ballots. The credential and elections committee shall insure that each delegate has been properly designated as a delegate by her club, and that her name badge identifies her as being entitled to vote. (Election of district officers shall be by delegates from that district only).
- INDEX #2 Amendment to the Region Bylaws, Article V, Elections, Section 5.2. The new officers shall be installed at the GWR conference and will assume office on July 1 of even-numbered years.
- INDEX #3 Amendment to the Region Bylaws, Article IX, Finance, Section 9.5, Control of Funds. The GWR Treasurer shall maintain a reserve account funded in the following manner: at the end of the fiscal year, 100% of the surplus revenue in the general fund shall go into the reserve account until a total amount of \$20,000 or one years' operating budget is reached, whichever is greater. Thereafter, additional surplus funds shall be allocated as follows:
 - a. 60% to the service fund
 - b. 40% to the general fund to be used in addition to the current operating expense budget. The net income from GWR service project shall go to the service fund.

INDEX #4 - Amendment to the Region Bylaws, Article IX, Finance, Section 9.2, Dues and Fees.

- a. Member Dues
 - For Clubs in existence as of July 1, the dues of the GWR shall be \$20.00 per member, per year. Exception: Life members. Dues are computed on membership as of July 1 and are due and payable to the GWR Treasurer within (ten) 10 days. Club dues are delinquent July 10. Delinquent clubs are subject to the provision of Article IX, Dues and Fees, Section 9.2e.
 - 2. New members joining a club on or after January 1 through June 30 shall be assessed prorated dues of \$10.00.
- b. Charter Member Dues: Charter member dues shall be paid to the GWR as follows:
 - 1. Clubs chartered July 1 through December 31: \$20.00 per member
 - 2. Clubs chartered January 1 through June 30: \$10.00 per member

2014 SIA GOVERNOR'S ROUND TABLE/REGION CHAIR TRAINING

Incoming GWR Governor Sandi Cvercko attended 2014 Governor's Round Table held just after the 42nd Annual SIA Biennial Convention in Vancouver Canada. The SIA staff introduced tools from the SIA website to help clubs realize the new direction of Shaping the Future and entering into a culture of philanthropy within their own organization. The tools could be used as a way of assessing the collective impact of their own club. The Governors were given a new hand out piece for the clubs called "Club Roadmap for Success" that outlined goals in each pillar area as a guide to clubs unsure what the new programs meant. The Governors were also introduced to a format called a "Guidelines for a Healthy Region" to help assess the strength of the Region and its relationship to the clubs.

42nd BIENNIAL CONVENTION OF SOROPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL OF THE AMERICAS, Inc.

Golden West Region Soroptimist were among the many Soroptimist members, friends and guests to attend the 42nd Biennial Convention held this year in Vancouver Canada. There were many changes introduced at the general sessions including the renaming of the Women's Opportunity Award. The new name is Live Your Dream Award, which is thought to more effectively communicate the intention of the award. The new girl program was also introduced. "Dream It, Be It" was rolled out. DIBI is an event for high school girls rather than an award as Violet Richardson was. The curriculum is being developed and will be available on the SIA website early in 2015. There was also much discussion regard raising the SIA dues over the next several years, and putting the dues raises in the future in the hands of the SIA Board of Directors. Both items passed the vote at convention and would be sent to the clubs for a final vote. The Golden West Region was recognized for 100% participation in the Live Your Dreams Award.

GWR Bylaws

- INDEX #1 Amendment to the Region Bylaws, Mission Statement. PREAMBLE: The Golden West Region (GWR), of Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc., is an unincorporated nonprofit association comprised of Soroptimist clubs operating within GWR's territory as defined by Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc., and by these Bylaws.
- INDEX #2 Amendment to the Region Bylaws, Article I, Section 1.2 Territorial Limits. The territorial limits of GWR are established by Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc. (SIA) and currently include San Bernardino and Riverside Counties of California; Arizona, except Yuma County; New Mexico and El Paso County in Texas.
- INDEX #3 Amendment to the Region Bylaws, Article II, Purpose. GWR exists to promote the vision, values and mission of Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc. and to provide administrative support, assistance and encouragement to GWR member clubs and their respective members.

- INDEX #4 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article IV, Section 4.3 Vacancies. a. Upon expiration of the term of the Governor or upon the inability to serve, the governor-elect shall succeed to that office, complete the unexpired term, and serve as governor in the biennium for which the governor-elect was elected. The GWR Board shall fill the office of governor-elect thus vacated. The member so appointed may not succeed to the office of governor but shall be eligible for election as governor-elect or governor, if a vacancy still occurs. A new governor-elect shall be elected at the next GWR conference.
- INDEX #5 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article IV, Section 4.3 Vacancies. b. Other vacancies on the board of directors shall be filled by delegate vote at the GWR conference. If, however, a GWR conference shall not be held within 60 days after the vacancy occurs, the GWR board shall fill it. During the period of an unfilled vacancy in any GWR office board of director position, the governor shall make provision for carrying on the necessary business of the GWR.
- <u>INDEX #6 -</u> Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article IV Officers, and Article IV Board of Directors. ARTICLE IV - Board of Directors

Section 4.1 Members

The board of directors shall consist of the officers and district directors.

Section 4.2 Officers

The elected officers shall be governor, governor-elect, secretary and treasurer.

Section 4.3 Authority

The board of directors has administrative authority over the affairs, funds, and property of the GWR, except that they may not modify any action taken by the delegates at a GWR conference.

Section 4.4 Term of Office

Elected officers shall hold office for two years beginning July 1 in even-numbered years or until their successors are elected. The secretary, treasurer and district directors shall be eligible for no more than two terms in the same office.

Section 4.5 Duties

- a. Governor: The governor shall preside at all conferences and all meetings of the GWR board; coordinate with the secretary the issuance of minutes within 30 days of board meetings; coordinate with the secretary, the issuance of a call to conference at least 60 days prior to the date of the meeting; approve expenditures in accordance with the budget; serve as an exofficio member of all committees except nominating; and perform such other duties as may be assigned by the board or prescribed by these bylaws.
- b. Governor-elect: The governor-elect shall prepare for assuming the office of governor by becoming familiar with all aspects of the Soroptimist organization; work closely with and under the direction of the governor, assisting to the fullest extent possible; in the absence of the governor, she shall preside at meetings. In case of the temporary inability of the governor to serve, the governor-elect shall assume the duties of governor. The governor-elect shall be empowered to appoint committees to serve in the next biennium after January 1 of the year in which the new term commences.
- c. Secretary: The secretary shall attend meetings of the GWR board; record the minutes of board meetings and conference; coordinate with the governor, the issuance of minutes within 30 days after the close of the meetings; coordinate with the governor, the issuance of a call to conference at least 60 days prior to the date of the meeting.
- d. Treasurer: The treasurer shall attend meetings of the GWR board; deposit and disburse all funds belonging to the GWR under the direction of policies developed by the GWR board; provide financial reports at board meetings and GWR conferences; prepare the annual budget with the finance committee to be approved by the membership, and serve as an ex-officio member of the GWR finance committee.
- e. District Directors shall plan and preside at district meetings, coordinate the issuance of a call to district meetings and keep in close communication with all clubs in the district, reporting

upon conditions or problems with the district to the GWR governor. District directors shall attempt to visit each club within the district at least once during the biennium for the purpose of providing Soroptimist education, leadership development and recruitment and retention advice.

Section 4.6 Removal from Office

Any officer or district director of the GWR may be removed, either for or without cause, by the GWR board if, in the judgment of the board, the best interests of the GWR will be served. Such removal shall be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of any person so removed. Removal shall occur only upon a two-thirds vote of the board then in office, exclusive of the person being removed, and only after being given an opportunity to be heard by a review board, appointed by the GWR board, independent of the GWR board.

Section 4.7 Vacancies

- a. Should a vacancy occur in the office of governor, the governor-elect shall automatically succeed to that office and complete the unexpired term in addition to the following biennium. The GWR board shall fill the office of governor-elect thus vacated; the member so appointed may not succeed automatically to the office of governor but shall be eligible for election as governor-elect or governor, if a vacancy still occurs. A new governor-elect shall be elected at the next GWR conference.
- b. Other vacancies in office shall be filled by delegate vote at the GWR conference. If, however, a GWR conference shall not be held within 60 days after the vacancy occurs, the GWR board shall fill it. During the period of an unfilled vacancy in any GWR office, the governor shall make provision for carrying on the necessary business of the GWR.

Section 4.8 Regular Meetings

The board of directors shall meet immediately before and after the conference in the city where the conference is held; at such times during the conference as the governor or the board deem necessary to complete business and to consider any questions or recommendations referred to it by the conference. Such other meetings as a majority of the Board consider necessary and possible within the budget may be held only with at least 15 days notice.

Section 4.9 Special Meetings

Special meetings of the board may be called by the governor and shall be called upon the written request of at least three (3) members of the board. At least seven (7) days notice (personal, written, e-mail or telephone) shall be given. The business transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to the purpose stated in the call.

Section 4.10 Quorum

The quorum for board meetings shall be a majority of the board.

Section 4.11 Mail Ballots

- a. The GWR board may vote by mail, fax or electronic transmission, except when a meeting will be held within 20 days. The subject matter of the mail ballot may be initiated by the governor, any two members of the GWR board, by GWR committees, by not less than three clubs of the GWR or by the SIA president. The ballots shall contain background information concerning the subject matter and the question shall be clearly stated. If the action proposed requires use of GWR funds, the ballot shall state from which account it is proposed to draw. b. Board members shall return their response to any mail ballot to the GWR secretary within 15 days of the date of ballot.
- c. The GWR secretary shall report the results promptly to the governor, with a written report to the board members on the results of the vote.
- d. If a GWR vote is required between conferences, the GWR officers, district directors, past governors of the GWR, and club delegates shall vote by mail. The clubs in the GWR will be advised of the results of the mail ballot in the next GWR mailing, but this should be no later than 45 days after the result of the mail ballot.
- INDEX #7 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article IV, Section 4.2 Term of Office. Elected board members shall hold office for two years beginning July 1 in even-numbered years or until their

successors are elected. The secretary, treasurer and district directors shall be eligible for no more than two consecutive terms in the same office.

- INDEX #8 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article V, Section 5.2. Elections. e. The new Board of Directors shall be installed at the GWR conference and will assume office on July 1 of evennumbered years.
- INDEX #9 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article VII, Section 7.1 Annual Conference. a. The GWR shall hold an annual conference for the purpose of conducting the business of the GWR, promoting Soroptimist projects and programs and in order to provide opportunities for leadership and personal development of members. The GWR board will approve final venue and dates. The call to conference shall include: a tentative agenda, all proposed amendments and resolutions, the report of the nominating committee together with candidates' qualifications, the proposed region budget, and such additional GWR and/or SIA information as may be deemed necessary.
- INDEX #10 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article VII, Section 7.1 Annual Conference. a. The GWR shall hold an annual conference for the purpose of conducting the business of the GWR, promoting Soroptimist projects and programs and in order to provide opportunities for leadership and personal development of members. The GWR board will approve final venue and dates. The call to conference shall include: a tentative agenda, all proposed amendments and resolutions, the report of the nominating committee together with candidates' qualifications, the proposed region budget, and such additional GWR and/or SIA information as may be deemed necessary. b. Delegates representing a majority of the clubs in the GWR shall constitute a quorum of the conference.
- INDEX #11 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article VII Meetings, Section 7.1 Annual Conference. a. The GWR shall hold an annual conference for the purpose of conducting the business of the GWR, promoting Soroptimist projects and programs and in order to provide opportunities for leadership and personal development of members. The GWR board will approve final venue and dates. The call to conference shall include: a tentative agenda, all proposed amendments and resolutions, the report of the nominating committee together with candidates' qualifications, the proposed region budget, and such additional GWR and/or SIA information as may be deemed necessary. b. Delegates representing a majority of the clubs in the GWR shall constitute a quorum of the conference. c. The voting members of the conference shall be the GWR board of directors, past governors of the GWR who are members of a club within the GWR and the three accredited delegates of each club in good standing with SIA.
- INDEX #12 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article VIII Committees, Section 8.1 Standing Committees. b. Nominating: a committee consisting of at least three persons shall be elected in odd-numbered years for the purpose of soliciting nominations from the clubs and proposing candidates for election to the GWR Board of Directors.
- <u>INDEX #13</u> Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article VIII Committees, Section 8.3 Region Committee Chairs. The Governor will appoint Region Committee Chairs with duties and responsibilities for the Region Committees required by SIA.
- INDEX #14 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article VIII—Committees, Section 8.1 Standing Committees. a. Credentials & Elections: a committee consisting of at least four members, one representative of each district, to serve as tellers, shall be appointed by the governor prior to each conference. The committee shall verify the credentials of the voting members of the conference and report each day the number of voting members and others registered. No member standing for office shall serve on this committee. b. Nominating: a committee consisting of at least four members, one representative of each district, shall be elected in odd-numbered years for the

purpose of soliciting nominations from the clubs and proposing candidates for election to GWR office. c. Laws and Resolutions: a committee consisting of at least four members, one representative of each district, shall be appointed by the GWR governor to serve on this committee for the biennium. The committee shall review all proposed resolutions and amendments to the GWR bylaws and insure their inclusion in the call to conference each year. Proposals from clubs must be submitted to the committee chair by January 1 prior to the conference each year. d. Program: a committee consisting of at least four members, one representative of each district, shall be appointed by the governor to promote and administer Soroptimist programs in concert with the SIA. e. Membership: a committee consisting of at least four members, one representative of each district, shall be appointed each biennium by the GWR governor to serve as a resource for clubs needing assistance with recruitment and retention of members. This committee shall also work in cooperation with the SIA and under the direction of the GWR board in extension activities for the formation, orientation and nurturing of new clubs in the GWR. f. Fundraising: a committee consisting of at least four members, one representative of each district, shall be appointed by the GWR governor in order to promote fund-raising activities to support the programs of the SIA. g. Finance: a committee consisting of at least four members, one representative of each district, shall be appointed by the GWR governor to prepare the annual budget and review the financial affairs of the GWR. The GWR treasurer shall be an ex-officio member of this committee. h. GWR Conference: The GWR board shall appoint a conference coordinator and an assistant conference coordinator from among members of the region. Additional committee members may be added to the conference committee upon recommendation from the conference coordinator and with the approval of the GWR governor. i. Public Awareness: a committee consisting of at least four members, one representative of each district, shall be appointed by the Region Governor to assist clubs with increasing the visibility of the organization locally and to promote awareness of Soroptimist in the region as a volunteer organization of business and professional women whose mission is to improve the lives of women and girls. The chair shall work closely with federation headquarters to develop and implement the necessary resources and strategies to meet public awareness goals.

- INDEX #15 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article IX, Section 9.4 Solicitation of Funds. Funds shall not be solicited by GWR from members of clubs, except when action authorizing such solicitation has been specifically approved by the GWR conference after notice to the clubs through the call to conference or, if the GWR conference will not be held within three months, by the GWR board by a two-thirds vote at a meeting or a three-fourths vote by mail ballot.
- INDEX #16 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article XI, Section 11.1 Submittal. To be considered at the conference, copies of proposed resolutions must be delivered to the coordinator of the Laws and Resolutions Committee, the governor and the secretary, by mail or email, for which there is evidence of receipt, not less than 120 days before the conference. All proposed resolutions properly and timely delivered, together with the report of the GWR laws and resolutions committee, must be included with the call to conference.
- INDEX #17 Amendment to Region Bylaws, Article XI, Section 11.2 Resolutions Not in Call.
 Resolutions other than those involving funding decisions that are not included in the "call to
 conference" may be presented for action at the conference by the Laws and Resolutions
 Committee upon recommendation of the board. Action may not be taken on such resolutions
 unless three-fourths of those voting at the conference vote to consider the resolution.
