



A special meeting has been scheduled for February 21 for the purpose of finalizing the activities for the club's project. They need not be expensive, but something appropriate for young girls; i.e., hair brushes, combs, ribbons or scrunchies, nail grooming products, lotions, etc. Please bring these items to the planning meeting. The flyer has also been printed and is available to all members. This program is one of our more rewarding projects. While a hot lunch is served to our guests, each member is responsible to pay \$10.00 for their own meal. When you attend, remember to wear your Soroptimist pin and be ready to pitch in to help as needed, especially with the dream boards that the girls will be making for themselves. The time of the WINGS event is 9:00 a.m. / 1:30 p.m. on March 2.

Fiscal management

When the club budget was passed at our September business meeting, the members concluded it would be wise to set a time to review the club's fiscal situation mid-year. This would involve comparing the budgeted items and amounts with any payments made since September, and evaluating where the club stands financially as it relates to future expenditures for the balance of the club year. Do our Ways and Means projects earn sufficient money to provide enough income along with dues, or could there be a shortfall at the end of the year? Should the club consider additional Ways and Means projects and /or perhaps trimming of some of the expense items where possible?

The result of the budget review at the January board meeting indicated that earnings are holding fairly steady, but it was suggested a yard sale in May or June should be a serious consideration. The report to the members of the Board's findings and recommendations will be presented to the members and any revisions to the budget, if necessary, can be taken into consideration and voted on by the members in a timely manner so as to end the club year with a healthy treasury sufficient to meet the club's obligations and to insure sufficient carry-over to the next fiscal year.

Nominations and elections

In compliance with the club bylaws, the Board discussed the appointment of a nominating committee to nominate candidates for club officers for the next club year beginning July 1. President Michelle appointed Cathie Weber to chair the committee and the Board selected Roberta Bamert to serve. A third member will be selected at the business meeting in February. The committee will meet to be prepared to present a recommended slate of officers at the March business meeting. This will be the first reading of the results of their efforts. The second reading will be at the April business meeting. At that time, there may be further nominations from the floor and ultimately the members will vote on the final slate. Members are advised to be familiar with Article X of the bylaws regarding nominations and elections. It is also a good time to review Article IV, Officers and Directors. All members have the responsibility to be aware of how the club is to function and to be willing to participate as needed. Membership is more than paying dues and attending meetings. It should be noted that in sharing with others the tasks needed to serve the club are very rewarding and appreciated. Also important is to be aware that there are also committee assignments when all members are needed to fill positions in order for the club to meet our goals of helping women and girls.

Curious Customs

Opening an umbrella indoors—a good thing or a bad thing? The umbrella reached England by way of Italy early in the seventeenth century and at that time was employed both as a shield against bad weather and as a shade against the sun. The Italian word *ombrella*, in fact, means "little shade." The superstition against opening umbrellas indoors is a common one in the British Isles, and no doubt it traveled to the New World from there.

That this action would be considered unnecessary or foolish is understandable, but

why would it be seen as dangerous? E. and M. A. Radford hint at an origin in sympathetic magic, since "an umbrella unnecessarily opened during fine weather may bring down the rain." Rudolph Brasch provides a more subtle rationale, suggesting that indoor umbrella usage violates "the right order of things" and may thus be seen by the superstitious as testing of the powers that be. Specifically, such behavior might be seen as insulting to God –who "intended umbrellas to be employed out of doors"—or to "the spirit of the umbrella" itself. A third insultee, I would suggest, would be the spirits of the household, who might be piqued at the implication that their protection must be supplemented by an overhead shield. Of course, simple pragmatism may also enter in: The custom may enshrine a long-forgotten accident in which someone opened an umbrella in his house and knocked over a burning candle or the china.
