Founder's Day

Soroptimists throughout the world celebrate Founder's Day on October 3. The first Soroptimist club was in Oakland, California and chartered on October 3, 2021, and was called the Alameda County Soroptimist Club. Their first president was Violet Richardson. Later, when a separate Berkeley Club was formed, the name of the first club became the Oakland Club. Much has changed over the past 98 years as Soroptimist has grown into an international organization. There are currently 4 Federations (SIA, SIE, SIGBI

and SISWP). Plans are underway to celebrate the 100th anniversary in 2021. There are 75,000 clubs in 122 countries throughout the world. Members advocate for human rights and gender equality.

The San Bernardino Club is a member club of SI of the Americas and was chartered on March 28, 1947, making the club 72 years old. The members have always remained dedicated to our mission of helping women and girls to improve their lives and we look forward to continuing to do so. In

doing so, it takes work and dedication to stay strong. The key to success is a viable membership in order to have a sufficient number of members to carry out the work of the club. Currently a major focus for the club is increasing our numbers. New members are needed and each current member must work together to help our club grow.

Debbie Reul

May 12, 1954 - February 19, 2019

A long time member of the Soroptimist club, Debbie Reul, recently passed away. Debbie served on many committees as a chair and a committee member as well as an officer on the Executive Board. She held the office of President for 2 terms, 2000 / 2001 and 2001 / 2002 and again for 1 term for 2007 / 2008. She was thoroughly dedicated to the Soroptimist mission and willingly took on many assignments. When Debbie first served as President she brought a new idea to the Board to consider for a new service project. Her suggestion was for a workshop type of event for young girls to give them the basis for proper etiquette, appropriate dress, grooming tips, tips on courtesy, etc. The Board members brainstormed her idea and a plan was developed to present to the members for their consideration and approval to proceed. Debbie had also envisioned a logo or brand to identify the project and butterflies came to mind. From this we settled on an acronym of WINGS which stood for Women Inspired to Nurture Girls to Succeed. Thus the WINGS project was born and has been an event of the club for many years. It has changed and developed into the one-day workshop we hold today from a series of

meetings with students who volunteered to attend in a classroom at one of the local middle schools for a once a week workshop after the school day ended. The subjects varied from makeup, how to handle money, color pallets, nail care, proper dress, writing thank you notes, etc. The club has since linked it to the Dream It, Be It program of SIA and the date each year is on the first Saturday of March which was originally designated as a Soroptimist Saturday of Service for clubs in the Region. The SOS project grew to include clubs in the Federation and our WINGS program has become an extension of the Dream It, Be It project of SIA.

We have Debbie to thank for her legacy to our club. When she retired from her job at the Automobile Club, Debbie wanted to pursue some activities that she hadn't been able to fit into her work schedule along with the various volunteer projects she worked with in the community. Golf was a major choice and she avidly pursued her game following her retirement. Unfortunately she made the decision to step away from her Soroptimist membership. However, she kept an active life style at a more relaxed pace and continued to support our

club's events. She enjoyed her family and was a dedicated mother to her daughters who the members will remember their attending the club's Victorian Teas.

Debbie passed on February 19, 2019, after a brief illness which developed suddenly approximately 4 months prior. A memorial was arranged for her by her family and the club's Historian, Sheila Brown, represented the club with her comments that she was "one of a kind." She lightened the mood wherever she was and impressed everyone with her cheerfulness, her love of her family as well as her passion for life and her golf. She was always fun to have around.
