

WHAT ARE YOU READING?

In our August Newsletter we had a "mini-fun-raiser" by doing an Ice Cream survey among SI M/IV Members.

It was so successful, that Member Helen McAlary has now challenged us to share a <u>brief review</u> of a recently read/reading book(s). Helen has pledged a donation to "Fines & Brags" for each reply.

Helen--Writers & Lovers by Lily King. I placed this book on hold at the library because I loved King's prior novel, Euphoria. When I realized it was a novel about someone writing a novel I almost didn't read it. That would have been a mistake. Our protagonist, Casey Peabody, is at a turning point in her life, having recently lost her mother, finding and losing love, and writing her novel. If you are looking for a novel that is smart, funny, heartbreaking, beautifully written and powerful--pick up this one. Fans of Anne Patchett & Elizabeth Strout will love this novel.

Arlette--I just finished reading 2 books! American Dirt--an amazing story of a brave woman and her young son's journey escaping Mexico and coming to America, after her entire family was killed. And-- I'm Not Your Perfect Mexican Daughter--about a young girl who mourns the death of her sister and is trying to puzzle the pieces of her dead sister's life while trying to be her own independent woman. In the meantime her old-fashioned Mexican parents want her to follow the family traditions while she wants to go to college and be her own person. I'm currently reading A Perfect Marriage. (I'm only a couple chapters in.)

I just want to say---Helen I think was a great idea!!! I will match Helen's donation. I love to read and it's what is keeping a lot of us sane right now. If anybody needs books or wants to start a book club let me know!

Amber--Great idea Helen! I read <u>A World Full Of Strangers</u> by Cynthia Freeman. It was such an excellent book that I looked for another book written by her. I found and am now reading "Portraits". It is a story about an immigrant family from the Polish ghetto who came to America and spans four generations. If you like a story of struggle and success, you will like this book. I highly recommend it and I will be looking for more of her books.

Kris--Just finished *The Things You Save in a Fire* by Katherine Center. Story of a female firefighter in a Texas fire station and her story of trying to be accepted. A little romance, but not too much to overwhelm the storyline. Well written and good story. I'm also reading a lot of Nantucket, Cape Cod, etc., "beachy" books. With all that is going on these days, I need an escape. Not my usual genre.

Virginia--I saw this book posted on Facebook through someone's Book Club....and, I think, it may have been our own Kathy. Meet Me In Monaco" by Hazel Gaynor & Heather Webb. "Set in the 1950's against the backdrop of Grace Kelly's whirlwind romance & unforgettable wedding to Prince Rainier of Monaco.... a story of passion, fate, and second chances." And, since, I'll never get to Monaco, it was interesting to read descriptions of various sites and landmarks. It was a quick, enjoyable read and like Kris said--"an escape" during these days. Also recently read When You See Me by Lisa Gardner and am finishing Final Judgment by Marcia Clark.

Linda--I don't have time to do much reading these days--other than my bible study group study guide book: "Is Genesis History?"

Denise--I am currently reading 4th of July by James Patterson. It is the fourth book in his Women's Murder Club series.

Kathy--I belong to a Travel Book Club and have enjoyed the concept of reading a good novel while exploring the inner sanctum of the country and its culture and traditions. *The Henna Artist*, by Alka Joshi, is set in the backdrop of 1950's Pink City of Jaipur, India. I have traveled to Jaipur which made it even more enticing with each turn of the page. A 17 year old girl, escapes an abusive marriage and becomes the most requested Henna Artist in the City while navigating the Wealthy Women's gossip and vengeance. A young half-sister she never knew existed is brought to her door by her 'long ago husband", and the story twists and turns into a 'where do I go from here' portrayal of India's opulent wealth, colorful surrounding, charming social lifestyle, ethnic vegetarian dishes, and the resourceful people of the cast system. Both predictable and then surprising, *The Henna Artist* is a good read. Easily available on Amazon.

Roberta-- Extremely Loud and Incredibly Close by Jonathan Safran Foer. Young Oskar Schell notes the moment when "tragedies started to wobble," and he found himself contributing to the great "Reservoir of Tears." He seeks release. This 2006 novel takes us on a quest with a young hero who, in possession of a key, searches the five boroughs of New York for the lock it will open. He yearns for answers and resolution to the pain he feels at the loss of his father in the September 11, 2001 attacks on New York. He just knows his father left that key as a clue for his gifted young son. The narrative voice shifts from nine-year-old Oskar Schell to letters written by his mute and mostly absent grandfather and his very present grandmother. There are painful links to the horrific bombings of Dresden and Hiroshima as the narrators struggle to find some sense of resolution and healing. Don't despair, for Oskar, our young hero ultimately does not, and there are many charming and even humorous elements. For example, a tale-within-the-tale makes us wonder if there ever was a sixth borough of New York that simply floated away. The adults in Oskar's world seem remote and even unaware of his struggles and adventures, but remember that our primary narrator is a grieving 9 year-old boy. Through his escapades, often accompanied by his 103 year-old neighbor, Abe, Oskar discovers his loving network of family and other fellows who keep watch over him during his guest.

Note: This novel is best read in print form because of several interesting and effective visual and typographical elements. The book was made into a motion picture in 2011.

Natividad--I am actually busy right now taking online courses for my continuing education right, but do have time for some reading--<u>Healing</u> by J. Pinchott. A collection of advice for recovering your inner strength and spirit from the World's Most Famous Survivors. I enjoy reading Psychology/Self Help the most but also a variety of poetry and short stories (English/Spanish) and, yes, children's books for my inner child that likes to have fun and adventures. I will look forward to Members reviews to take on new journeys.

Sue--What a great challenge! I love it! I spend a great deal of time reading agendas for boards and nonprofits I support. But, what interests me most is reading to our grandkids. Our granddaughter is 4 and grandson is one. What appeals to them? Our missy loves Winnie the Pooh, especially Pooh, Tigger, Eeyore, Piglet, Roo, and Rabbit. Our little man loves the pictures and giggles at my way of reading the stories. We are currently reading, <u>Positively Pooh</u>. I love Pooh's timeless wisdom.

Cindy--I am reading *Icy Sparks* by Gwyn Hyman Rubio. "A funny, sad, and transcendent, story of a young girl's growing up in Appalachia that introduces a fresh, quirky new southern voice." Story takes place in rural Kentucky in the 1950's. The first thing that caught my interest is how she came by her name. She is 10 and has an undiagnosed affliction. She wants to be good, but this affliction causes violent tics and uncontrollable cursing. "Narrated by a now grown Icy, this novel shimmers with warmth and humor." Not finished yet but I would recommend it. I enjoy books that cause me to laugh out loud.

Milissa--I decided to dig into one of my childhood favorite authors, and downloaded the complete works of Lucy Maud Montgomery. I had no idea that I was downloading over 9000 pages of work from this prolific author. I have now completed five books from the *Anne of Green Gables* series, which takes one through the life of an orphan, whose indomitable spirit carries her through her life struggles and into a new loving family relationship, that provides her the foundation for her life's adventures and struggles. The stories, set in Prince Edward Island, Canada from the 1890's to the 1920s, are told in a refreshingly wholesome and uplifting style, filled with family values and hope. I hope you all get a chance to delve into this series!

CHILD SEX TRAFFICKING

You can hardly imagine such a nightmare--you're an underaged *child* and brutally raped, but then the judge says, "You wanted it."

You'd be horrified by the injustice of it, of course. But this is exactly the nightmare that too many children are living in, as you read these words. They're tricked or lured by traffickers, then exploited--sold for sex--abused, tortured, day after day, year after year. Yet the children are the ones treated like criminals.

- 19 states can still arrest and prosecute victims for the crime committed against them.
- In fact, in a recent case, a judge in Texas unbelievably ruled that a minor trafficking victim got "a certain sense of excitement" out of the exploitation. He called it a "lifestyle" that she wasn't "entirely opposed to." This is NOT justice. This, in reality, is egregious injustice.

We must fight for the children who cannot fight for themselves.

As a founding member of San Bernardino Counties CASE (Coalition Against Sexual Exploitation) and founding Chairman of Southwest Conference Against Trafficking (SWCAT), I have seen firsthand how *Linda Smith*, Founder of <u>Shared Hope International</u> has exhaustingly worked to change laws and policies across the nation to stop this shocking injustice and ensure that victims receive protective services.

As a result of the efforts of state report cards and policy initiatives, the District of Columbia and 31 States (including California) have now changed their laws *to prohibit the criminalization of child sex trafficking victims for prostitution.*

But as Soroptimists we canNOT rest until the remaining 19 states properly protect our *child* victims and hold their exploiters accountable. This is a priority for Justice and Advocacy for the *children* of this heinous crime! Working together today, we can help <u>Shared Hope International</u> move law makers across the country into action. We can also help to continue training first responders, prosecutors, and judges so that victims no longer hear things like "I think you liked this," "You're the aggressor," or "I believe you were willing."

No *child* chooses a life of violence and victimization. *Children* should never be judged as criminals because they were exploited and brutalized. Linda Smith is a fierce competitor and from what I've seen in attending her Conferences and workshops over the years, she will *never* back down in the battle to preserve *children's* lives.
